PUBLIC SQUARE SWEEP BY FIRE

Spectacular Conflagration at
Alexandria Does Over
\$80,000 Damage

VISIBLE FOR MILES

REKIDNAP BY BOYS

Alexandria, Tenn., April 17.—(Special)—A spectacular conflagration of brick and mortar in all that became this morning of eight brick business houses situated on the south side of the public square, after a fire of unknown origin, started Wednesday night at 11:45 and was not brought under control until nearly two hours later. Robert W. Thompson, fire insurance adjuster of Nashville, estimated the loss at \$80,000 to \$90,000.
